

Evaluation is a significant tool to segregate students as refined, average, and slow learners into courses. The college adheres strictly to the rules and regulations of Karnatak University Dharwad and follows semi-annual classes accordingly. Every teacher prepares a lesson plan and showcase for the student at the start of the academic year. In addition, a copy of that is also presented to the principal, thus periodically reviewing the coverage of the syllabus.
